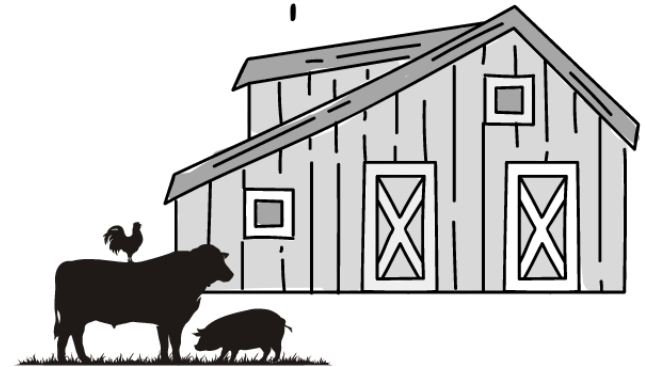

## General Rules Regulating the Fair

1. The Newton County Fair will be Aug. 19<sup>th</sup> – 27<sup>th</sup>.
2. All livestock exhibits will be entered from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 20<sup>th</sup>, while all building exhibits may be entered from 1 – 5 p.m.
3. Livestock will be judged on Monday, Aug. 21 at 6 p.m. Premium sale will begin at approximately 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 22. Livestock will be released immediately after the sale. Poultry and Rabbits may be released at the discretion of the Livestock Superintendent.
4. All Home Economics exhibits must be removed from the fairgrounds from 12 to 2 p.m. Sunday, August 27. Special arrangements will need to be made with the superintendent if you are unable to pick up your exhibits during this time. All exhibits remaining on the grounds 24 hours after the close of the fair become the property of the Fair Board unless other arrangements have been agreed to.
5. **There will be no ice chests or pets allowed inside the rodeo arena area.** Lawn chairs will be allowed only on the back row of the bleachers or in grassy area. Horses must be confined to designated area. No horses will be allowed inside the amusement area. No ATVs will be allowed around the stock barns, or in the amusement area. All ATVs must remain parked in designated areas and remain turned off until time for your event. Anyone not obeying these rules will be disqualified and asked to leave.
6. The Newton County Fair Board will not assume or pay any obligation unless prior approval has been obtained from their finance committee!
7. Every precaution will be taken against loss or damage to any article, animal or exhibit and in no case, shall the Fair Board, its members, staff, volunteers, or management of the fair be liable for any theft, loss, or damage that might occur to any person, animal, or articles. The Fair Board will not be liable for any accident that might occur to any exhibitor, contestant, or spectator at the fair.
8. Each exhibitor will secure a number before entering an exhibit. They will keep this number in all departments.
9. No cash premiums will be awarded for articles not listed in catalog.
10. No unworthy articles shall be eligible to receive a premium. In case of no competition in a class, the judges will have the right to make the award to first, second or third place, as they feel the exhibit deserves.
11. Judges will be provided and the judge's decision will be final. Chairmen in each division will be present to assist judges at time of placing awards.
12. All exhibit awards will be on the point basis.
13. An exhibitor may enter one article in each class unless stated otherwise.
14. Precautions are taken to prevent damage to or theft of articles entered in the fair, however, the Fair Board will not be responsible in case of theft or damage.

- Classes will be determined by engine size and performance of entries. Must be three entries to have a class.

- Kids will receive a trophy. Youth and Adult events cash payback.
- Helmets are required for all riders.
- **A contestant may only enter once per class.**
- All decisions made by judges are final.

### **Rules & Regulations**

1. All ATVs must be kept on Fair Grounds at all times. Anyone who leaves the grounds will be eliminated from competition.
2. ATVs must be left on the trailer until it is time for the competition to begin. If the ATV is driven to the grounds, then it must be parked until competition begins.
3. ATVs cannot be driven outside of arena, and nowhere on the midway of the grounds, there are no exceptions.
4. For the safety of competitors and spectators alike there will be no rough housing, no racing, or any unauthorized use of an ATV on the Newton County Fair Grounds.
5. The Newton County Fair Board and Directors are not responsible for accidents, injury or theft of property.
6. Entry in the contest constitutes agreement to release the Newton County Fair and Rodeo, its board of directors, staff, judges, and volunteers from any and all liability.
7. Anyone who fails to abide by these rules will be asked to leave the grounds and is subject to be ineligible in further competition. A representative of the fair board or a deputy will be on hand before, during and after ATV rodeo to enforce these rules.



## DEPARTMENT 10 TAME OR EXOTIC ANIMALS

Please call state veterinarian's office for information and permit.

### Pure Bred Statement

All breeds will be judged separately. All breeding stock must be purebred. Only Purebred, pure blood (one pure blood parent) livestock or animals equal to breed association herd book quality is admitted. (Except poultry and rabbits).

### Newton County Fair Livestock Premium Sale Guidelines

Livestock sold are the junior exhibitor's animals. All proceeds from the auction go directly to the junior exhibitor livestock owners.

1. Eligibility - The Newton County Fair Livestock Premium Sale is limited to members of a Newton County 4H Club or FFA Chapter. Exhibitors may participate in the sale no longer than the fall after graduating from high school. An animal may sell in only one Newton County Premium Sale during its show career.

2. Ownership and Feeding Instructions - Participants must own their own animals, must have acquired title and taken possession of same at the beginning of and throughout the feeding and fitting period. Animals must be fed, cared for and exhibited by the individual member under the supervision and direction of a Vocational Agriculture Instructor or a County Extension Agent. All market animals must be owned and nominated 30 days prior to show date in order to receive premium money.

3. Showing Animals - Each exhibitor must lead or drive his/her own animal in the sale.

4. Sale Order - The order for Premium Sale will be selected by the Livestock Stock Show Committee headed by the Grand and Reserve Grand Champions.

5. Only animals in the market classes will be eligible for the Newton County Fair Livestock Premium Sale.

6. Only one animal of any species per exhibitor can be sold at the Premium Sale. Should an exhibitor qualify two animals for the premium sale, the exhibitor must choose which one will be sold.

7. All Grand and Reserve Grand Champions will sell in the Premium Sale unless circumstances arise that violate number 6 shown above.

8. The Newton County Livestock Premium Sale Committee will handle the arrangements and details of the sale. They will secure the auctioneer, photographers, keep the official records of the sale and help solicit buyers.

### Important

You must fill out and return a livestock entry form if you are showing an animal of any kind. Forms are to be filled out and returned to the livestock superintendent. 15. State premium money will only be awarded to exhibitors who are a member of a Newton County EHC Club, 4H Club, or FFA Chapter.

16. Exhibitors must be a resident of Newton County, or a member of a Newton County 4-H, FFA, or EHC Club. **Livestock exhibitors of market animals must be at least 5 years of age.**

17. Newton County Fair Officers and Board Members are eligible to enter any contest for prizes.

18. Premium checks will be available at time of checkout other than livestock premiums or you may pay \$1 at entry to have your check mailed to you. All prize money not collected at the time of removal, except livestock premiums, will be considered a donation to the fair. Any checks not cashed within ninety (90) days will be void.

19. No arena admission or carnival ride tickets can be used the following year. All tickets must be used during the year in which they were purchased.

20. Public address systems are to be used by Fair Board Members only unless advanced written authorization is obtained from the Fair Board.

21. There will be designated parking areas for handicapped.

22. See individual Divisions for Division Rules.

23. See Livestock General Rules and Health Requirements.

24. There will be no rain date and gate admissions will not be refunded.

25. Any and all decisions made by the Newton County Fair Board will be final.

26. Any deviation from these General Rules or Division-specific rules will make the exhibitors ineligible for cash prizes. Once your entry is received or entry fee or admission ticket is paid you agree to any and all rules set by the Newton County Fair Board.

**27. The Newton County Fair Board reserves the right to change and modify the rules and regulations governing the fair at any time.**

### **DEPARTMENT 9 POULTRY**

Points - First: 4, Second: 3, Third: 2  
Grand Champion plus 5 points

Reserve Grand Champion plus 3 points  
An official representing the exhibition shall notify the State Veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition giving names, place, inclusive dates, and times of the event. The requirements are as follows:

1. All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibitions in Arkansas shall have originated from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited). This information will be documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during the exhibition.

2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wraparound plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.

3. Any poultry showing evidence of infection or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.

4. Record Keeping - The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry

present at exhibition. This list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, the species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months. Contact: Adam Willis at (870) 446-2240 before 4:30 p.m. for Pullorum-Typhoid test date. Testing must be done at least two (2) weeks before the exhibition date.

### **Chickens**

\*\*Exhibitor must provide feed and container and waterer.

Categories may be added if there are enough entries of that variety to justify an additional grouping.

Classes will be separated by Large and Bantam Breeds.

### **DEPARTMENT 4 GOATS**

Points - First: 10,  
Second: 7, Third: 5

Grand Champion plus 5 points  
Reserve Champion plus 3 points  
Showmanship - Junior and Senior Goats may be examined on grounds by fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel.

No goats showing evidence of abscesses and certainly draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians or state-federal personnel. Goats showing evidence of any other disease may be released.

### **Market Goat**

Market classes will be divided by weight. The minimum weight for Market Goats will be 30 lbs.

**\*Market Goats that do not meet weight requirements will be placed in a Prospect/Feeder class.**

### **Dairy Goat**

1. Junior Kid, birth to 6 months
2. Senior Kid, 6 - 12 months
3. Yearling, 12 - 24 months
4. Doe, 2 and 3 years
5. Doe, 4 years and over

### **Meat Goat**

Breeding stock only.

### **DEPARTMENT 5 RABBITS**

Points - First 4, Second 3, Third 2

Grand Champion plus 5 points  
Reserve Champion plus 3 points  
Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show. Rabbit entries will consist of a single rabbit. No diseased rabbits will be allowed to exhibit. All varieties will compete within their own variety. Example: Does with Does, Bucks with Bucks.

1. Junior Buck, under 6 months
2. Senior Buck, 6 months and over
3. Junior Doe, under 6 months

### **DEPARTMENT 7 CERVIDS**

Points - First 5

Cervids are any of various hoofed mammals of the family Cervidae, which include, caribou, elk, and moose.

Certificate of veterinary inspection required. Negative cervical tuberculosis test within ninety (90) days. Negative brucellosis test within ninety (90) days or originate from a Certified Brucellosis-Free and Accredited Tuberculosis Free Cervid Herd or originate from a Brucellosis-Monitored and a Qualified Tuberculosis Cervid Herd within ninety (90) days of exhibition.

### **Cervid**

Classes will be determined according to the participating entries. All varieties will compete within their own variety. Example: Does with Does, Bucks with Bucks.

### **DEPARTMENT 8 CAMELIDS**

Points - First 5

Camelids are any member of the family Camelidae of 2-toed ruminant artiodactyl mammals having a 3-chambered stomach and including the camels, alpacas, llamas, and vicuña. Certificate of veterinary inspection required. Negative tuberculosis test within ninety

No sheep showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, and scrapie will be allowed to show.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example.

Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed

representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

4. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

Points - First 10, Second 7, Third: 5  
Grand Champion plus 5 points  
Reserve Grand Champion plus 3 points  
Beef Showmanship - Junior and Senior  
All cattle must be free of warts, if there is any indication of warts the cattle will be disqualified and removed from grounds.

#### Replacement Heifer Show (only Grand and Reserve eligible for premium sale)

1. Heifers must have baby teeth at time of show.
2. Heifers must be raised and shown by members of a Newton County 4H or FFA chapter.
3. Heifers must be shown by a junior exhibitor.
4. Heifers will be in three divisions by breed group.
  - A. English Crosses-Polled Hereford, Hereford Angus, Red Poll, or other English Breed.
  - B. European Crosses-Simmental, Charolais, Limousin, etc.

The exhibitor, his or her guardian or the person who enters the exhibit on the exhibitor's behalf, expressly assumes any and all liability or responsibility for any accident, loss or damage to person or property as a result of his or her participation or arising out of the display of his or her exhibit, whether it be caused by the negligence or otherwise of the Newton County Fair, its Officers, Directors, Employees, Volunteers and Agents. By entering an exhibit, the Exhibitor, his or her guardian or the person who enters the exhibit on the Exhibitor's behalf, agrees to waive any and all claims, damages, demands, or cost against the Newton County Fair Board and its Officers, Directors, Employees, Volunteers and Agents.

2. No smoking or lighted candles, lamps, matches, etc., will be allowed in any stalls or booths on the grounds or in the building and/or tents.

3. Advertising by means of posters, prints, handbills, etc., will not be permitted on the Fairgrounds except upon written agreement of the management.

4. Sale of any article or service is prohibited except when approved by the Fair management through written contractual arrangement.

5. Students exhibitors, parents and/or guardians will not be allowed to sleep

overnight on the fairgrounds, except upon written agreement authorized by the Fair Management.

6. All exhibits must have been raised/trained/grown by the student exhibitor.

7. All exhibits must be checked in by the division superintendent(s).

8. The management of The Fair and the Exhibits Department and/or their designee reserve the right to remove and disqualify any exhibit which is not in the best interest of The Fair, or which is objectionable to The Fair, or endangers the public; or is objectionable in any way; or has been entered in violation of these official rules and regulations; or to reject, limit or disqualify the acceptance of, or the display of, any exhibit brought to the fairgrounds.

9. All livestock must be owned, pastured, and shown by members of a Newton County 4H or FFA chapter.

10. Minimum and/or maximum weights have been added to some of the market classes. Please check the requirements for your exhibit(s).

**NEW - 11. In the event of an exhibitor having more than one animal in a class, only members of a Newton County 4H Club or FFA Chapter can assist exhibitor in showing said animals.**

**NEW - 12. Exhibitors of market animals must be at least 5 years of age.**

### International Association of Fairs and Exposition National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as

documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90-Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate that will accompany the poultry during exhibition.

2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wraparound plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.

3. Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.

4. Record Keeping - The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at exhibition. This list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, the species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months.

### OTHER IN-STATE TAME OR EXOTIC ANIMALS

Please call State Veterinarian's office for information and permit.

### Disclosure

Any animal receiving medication for any life-threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered in the fair.

1. All livestock must be owned, pastured, and shown by members of a Newton County 4H Club or FFA chapter.

2. All animals must be owned (30) days prior to exhibit.

3. Cattle are to be halter broken. Neck ropes or collars should be used at night.

4. Livestock can be bedded on sawdust, shavings, straw, or other material

provided by the exhibitor. Livestock should be kept clean and the area neat.

If space is available, show boxes and other material may be kept in the barn. No premiums will be paid unless pens are cleaned by check out time.

5. To qualify for the Premium Sale, animal must be market animals.

Exhibitors must pre-register their animals with their Ag. instructor or county agent.

6. Exhibitors are responsible for care and feeding of animals and must be present for judging. Any exceptions will be determined by livestock

superintendent on a case-by-case basis. Decision by the judges is final.

7. Showmanship ages will be determined at the day of the show.

8. When a division is determined by weight there will be no single-entry class. Exhibit will be placed into the closest weight class.

9. All exhibitor checks will be mailed. No exceptions. Please enclose \$1 with each exhibitor form to cover postage and delivery.

10. Livestock stall will be assigned by the Livestock Superintendent and committee. Any tags or signage on stalls used to attempt to reserve stall space will be removed. Stalls will be assigned based on school or 4-H affiliation, breed, and/or quantity of animal. **Please mail your form or email a copy to**

### Scholarship Requirements

Applicants must:

- Be a graduating senior planning to enroll in an institute of higher learning this fall.
- Live within the boundaries of Newton County or graduating from a Newton County School.
- Must have participated in the Newton County Fair in previous years. Can be involved in livestock show, exhibit buildings, pageants, or a volunteer.
- Enclose one picture. Picture may not be returned.
- Have a 2.5 or higher G.P.A. Enclose a copy of high school transcript.

C. The name, complete address and phone number of the owner.

All instate sheep and goats in the state of Arkansas must be identified by an official USDA tag (scrapie tag) or for goats a legible official goat registry tattoo if accompanied by a registration certificate.

Fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel may examine sheep on grounds. Any sheep showing clinical symptoms of Scrapie shall be immediately quarantined in isolation and required to undergo any approved diagnostic tests and shall be consigned to slaughter or destruction with submission of tissues to an approved diagnostic laboratory at the exhibitor's expense.

Commingle (as defined by the Arkansas Scrapie Regulation) of sheep or goats of different flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program (VFCP) is prohibited and must be reported to the VFCP state official and State Veterinarian.

No sheep or goats showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection, evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel.

### ARKANSAS RABBITS

Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show.

### ARKANSAS HORSES

Negative EIA test required within the past twelve (12) months for all animals over six (6) months of age. Nursing foals under six (6) months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams Photocopies of

the test papers will not be accepted; carbon copies are acceptable.

### ARKANSAS CERVIDS

1. Certificate of veterinary inspection.
2. Negative cervical tuberculosis test within ninety (90) days.
3. Negative brucellosis test within ninety (90) days;
4. Or originate from a Certified Brucellosis-Free and Accredited Tuberculosis Free Cervid Herd;
5. Or originate from a Brucellosis-Monitored and a Qualified Tuberculosis Cervid Herd within ninety (90) days of exhibition.

### ARKANSAS CAMELIDS

1. Individually identified, and certificate of veterinary inspection within ninety (90) days of exhibition.
2. Registration papers when accompanied by registry photographs of the animal are acceptable identification.

### ARKANSAS RATITES

1. Certificate of veterinary inspection.
2. Negative avian influenza test within ninety (90) days.
3. Permanent identification.

### ARKANSAS POULTRY

An official representing the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition, giving names, place, inclusive dates, and time of the event.

The requirements are as follows:

1. All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibition in Arkansas shall have originated from U. S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited.) This information will be

## ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK COUNTY, JR. DISTRICT, DISTRICT, STATE FAIR LEVEL, AND OTHER SHOWS

1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.

2. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

### ARKANSAS CATTLE

1. If Arkansas is a Class Free State, Arkansas cattle are exempt from brucellosis testing. If Arkansas is not a Class Free State then the following testing requirements must be met: Negative brucellosis test within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and over. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd are exempt if the Certified Free Herd number is shown on certificate.

2. All heifers that are four to twelve (4-12) months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.

3. Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 1985, that are over twelve (12) months of age and are not official calf-hood vaccinates will not be allowed to show (unless they are from a Brucellosis Certified Free Herd.) This will not apply if Arkansas continues as a Brucellosis Free State.

4. All rodeo stock exhibited at a rodeo in Arkansas must meet the out of state

requirements for brucellosis and tuberculosis for twelve (12) month and older bulls, roping and dogging steers, and heifers even if the rodeo stock originates from Arkansas. Tie down roping calves are exempt from the tuberculosis testing requirements. The exception is a CVI within the state is good for ninety (90) days instead of thirty (30) days.

### ARKANSAS SWINE

1. As of July 1, 2001, all swine must have an official premise identification.

2. Animals six (6) months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within ninety (90) days of exhibition or originate directly out of a Validated Herd, with Validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested.)

3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within ninety (90) days of the exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originate directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.

4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

### ARKANSAS SHEEP AND GOATS

Exhibition officials must maintain records of all sheep and goats that are exhibited for a period of five years, to include:

- A. Identification Number
- B. Flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program

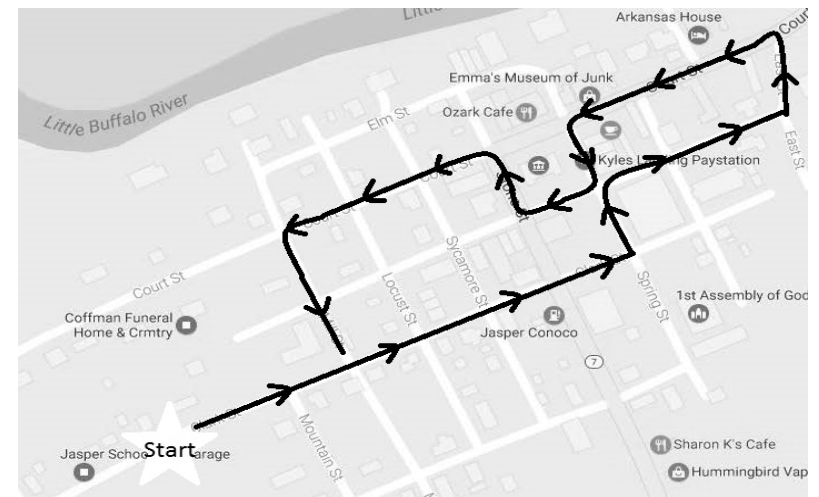
# Newton County Fair Parade

**Grand Marshals – 2023 Junior Farmers Brook Shepherd of Hasty and Hayden Moenning of Vendor**

Parade will assemble at the Jasper School grounds. All parade entries except horse and horse drawn conveyances should come to the back of the school grounds (through the Nance Addition). DO NOT attempt to come in from Clark Street by Special Services building.

- You will take the next place in line when you arrive, and the line will go through the school grounds and along the street.
  - Horses and horse trailers should go directly to Bradley Park and line up. Coggins papers will be checked on horses and mules as required by start law. All horses once mounted must be kept west of the school grounds entrance, until the parade starts
  - Trucks and horse trailers must stay on the roads. DO NOT drive across the grass.
  - The Color Guard, Grand Marshal, and Royalty will line up beside the Special Services Building on the Clark Street entrance. All other parade entries must come in through the Nance Addition on the backside of the school grounds.
  - Entries will be judged on appearance, theme and originality. Decision of the judges is final. **Fair theme is Newton County: Born & Raised.**
  - You must register before the parade begins. Judges will consider depiction of the theme as part of the score in selecting winners.
  - Parade winners will be posted at Saturday night rodeo. Trophies may be picked up at "The Shed" concession stand by the announcer's stand in the arena.
  - All 4-Wheelers must be parked and shutoff until the parade starts.
  - Anyone who does not follow the rules will be disqualified and asked to leave.
- Categories are: Best Decorated – 1. Truck, 2. Trailer, 3. Four-wheeler, 4. Newton County Fair Pageant Royalty Float, Best Dressed Junior & Senior Cowboy &



## Home Economics Department Rules and Regulations

1. All entries, including baked goods and flowers, are to be entered between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Sunday, August 21.
2. All articles and products must be the work of the exhibitor and should NOT have been exhibited in previous years. Articles must have been completed within the previous year.
3. No exhibitor shall duplicate entries in any class within a department
4. Unfinished or soiled articles will not be accepted.
5. Rules and regulations for the department apply to adult and junior exhibitors.
6. **ONLY AUTHORIZED PERSONNEL WILL BE ALLOWED IN BUILDING DURING JUDGING.**
7. No premium will be awarded on articles not listed in this premium list.
8. Every precaution will be taken against loss or damage of any article or exhibit and in no case, shall management or the fair board be held liable for any loss or damage that may occur to such articles or for any accident that may occur to any exhibitor or spectator.
9. Exhibits will be judged on their merits and judges will award 1st, 2nd or 3rd, or no rating as their judgment will indicate.
10. Articles will be judged Monday, August 19. The educational buildings will be closed throughout judging.
11. **REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS:** Exhibits may be removed from the department from 12 to 2 p.m. on Sunday, August 25. Removal before Sunday will result in premium being forfeited.
12. Age divisions are as follows: Children - ages 0 to 8 years. Juniors - ages 9 to 19, Adult - ages 20 +. For each class or

division in the senior division, there will be a corresponding one in the junior division

13. Participants should be non-professionals (Professional - one who makes his/her living by an art or game.)

14. In the case of no competition in any class, or where there are fewer exhibits shown in any class than the number of premiums offered, the judges may at their discretion award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserved.

## DEPARTMENT 12 FLOWERS

No diseased or bug infested exhibits will be accepted.

Please bring exhibits in small bottles or inexpensive containers no larger than 12 inches in diameter for cut foliage. No purchased flowers will be accepted. All specimen classes will be judged for cultural perfection, the container will not be considered. Each specimen should have some of its own foliage. Exceptions are large crested celosia and gladiolus. Multiple entries of the same specimen/plant type will not be accepted unless clearly belonging in separate classification.

No sheep or goats showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection, evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel.

## OUT-OF-STATE HORSES

1. Valid certificate of veterinary inspection with individual identification and a rectal temperature reading on each animal.
2. A negative EIA test must have been conducted on all equidae over six (6) months of age within twelve (12) months prior to the exhibition, and the EIA test papers must accompany the certificate. Nursing foals under six (6) months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams. (Photocopies of the test papers will not be acceptable--legible carbon copies will be acceptable.)

## OUT-OF-STATE RATITES

All ratites must have a negative test for avian influenza within thirty (30) days prior to entry and exhibition unless a state of emergency has been declared. They must be individually identified with a form of permanent identification and listed on a certificate of veterinary inspection with an entry permit number.

## OUT-OF-STATE CERVIDS

The regulations for the importation of Cervids lies with the Arkansas Game & Fish Commission.

## OUT-OF-STATE CAMELIDS

1. Individually identified, and valid certificate of veterinary inspection within thirty (30)
2. Permit number
3. Registration papers when accompanied by registry photographs of the animal are acceptable identification.

## OUT-OF-STATE RABBITS

No certificate of veterinary inspection required. Inspection will be made on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show.

## OUT-OF-STATE POULTRY

1. All poultry, which includes game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, turkeys, and waterfowl shall have originated from a US Pullorum clean flock or have had a negative pullorum test within ninety (90) days of entry. All turkeys shall also have originated from a US MG clean flock or have had a negative MG test within thirty (30) days of entry. All the preceding information must be documented on a valid certificate of veterinary inspection, NPIP flock certification form or similar . certificate. These forms must indicate that the flocks from which the eggs or chicks originated have been tested for pullorum disease and were free of reactors; or, any eggs or chicks or poults produced under the supervision of the National Poultry Improvement Plan will be deemed to have met with the requirements of these regulations, provided all of requirements of NPIP are complied with and applicable NPIP forms accompany birds. All non-certified poultry must be individually identified, either by a permanent leg or wing band or tattoo. Wraparound plastic bands are not acceptable. NPIP certified flocks of turkeys, chickens, and domesticated fowl entering on a VS 9-3 or NPIP flock certification form or similar certificate are exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection unless a state of emergency has been declared.

## OTHER OUT-OF-STATE TAME OR EXOTIC ANIMALS



veterinarian, retested for tuberculosis every twelve (12) months thereafter, and obtain an entry permit prior to entering Arkansas. No sexually intact rodeo stock from Mexico will be permitted into Arkansas.

6. Rodeo stock from any state that has lost its tuberculosis (TB) accreditation must be tested negative for tuberculosis within sixty (60) days prior to their utilization as rodeo or roping stock and retested for tuberculosis every twelve (12) months thereafter.

4. The State Veterinarian may designate high incidence areas within certain states that must meet additional import restrictions and retest requirements.

### OUT-OF-STATE SWINE

1. As of July 1, 2001, an official premise identification and individual identification.

2. Valid certificate of veterinary inspection

3. Permit number

#### 4. Brucellosis requirements:

Negative brucellosis test on all intact males (i.e., barrows excluded) and females six (6) months of age and older, within thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition. Animals originating directly out of Validated Brucellosis Free Herds, with the Validated Free Herd number and date of last test on the certificate, and animals from Swine Brucellosis Free States are exempt from testing requirements.

#### Pseudorabies requirements:

A negative pseudorabies test, regardless of age, within thirty (30) days prior to exhibition. Animals originating out of Pseudorabies Qualified Herds, with the Qualified Herd number on the certificate, and animals from

Pseudorabies Free states are exempt from testing.

### OUT-OF-STATE SHEEP AND GOATS

All sheep and goats entering Arkansas for exhibition shall meet all requirements for entry into Arkansas. All sheep and goats imported or exhibited within the state of Arkansas must be identified by an official USDA tag (scrapie tag) or for goats a legible official goat registry tattoo if accompanied by a registration certificate.

All sheep and goats exhibited within Arkansas must have a certificate of veterinary inspection within thirty (30) days of exhibition.

Exhibition officials must maintain records of all sheep and goats that are exhibited for a period of five years, to include:

- a) Identification Number
  - b) Flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program
  - c) The name, complete address and phone number of the owner.
- Fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel may examine sheep on grounds. Any sheep showing clinical symptoms of Scrapie shall be immediately quarantined in isolation and required to undergo any approved diagnostic tests and shall be consigned to slaughter or destruction with submission of tissues to an approved diagnostic laboratory at the exhibitor's expense.

Commingle (as defined by the Arkansas Scrapie Regulation) of sheep or goats of different flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program (VFCP) is prohibited and must be reported to the VFCP state official and State Veterinarian.

D. Originate from a state having a reciprocal agreement with Arkansas;

E. All sexually intact cattle and bison, from any foreign country or part thereof with no recognized tuberculosis status comparable to the Uniform Methods and Rules standards of the U.S. Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Program, imported for reasons other than immediate slaughter or feeding for slaughter must meet the following criteria:

1. Obtain a permit issued by the Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission prior to entry, and
2. Be quarantined to the Arkansas premises approved in the entry permit pending two (2) consecutive negative tuberculosis tests. The first test to be conducted not less than ninety (90) nor more than one hundred twenty (120) days after arrival and the second test to be not less than two hundred ten (210) days nor more than two hundred forty (240) days after arrival in Arkansas; or
- F. Importation of steers and spayed heifers from Mexico,

1. Steers and spayed heifers from Mexican states that have been determined by the State Veterinarian of Arkansas, based on the recommendations of the Bi-National Committee, to have fully implemented the Control/Preparatory Phase of the Mexican Tuberculosis Eradication Program may enter Arkansas provided they have been tested negative for tuberculosis in accordance with the Norma Oficial Mexicana (NOM) within sixty (60) days prior to entry into the United States and obtain an entry permit prior to entering Arkansas.

2. Steers and spayed heifers from Mexican states that have been determined by the State Veterinarian of Arkansas, based on the recommendations of the Bi-National Committee, to have fully implemented the Eradication Phase of the Mexican Tuberculosis Eradication Program by March 1, 1997, may enter Arkansas provided they have been tested negative for tuberculosis in accordance with the Norma Oficial Mexicana (NOM) within sixty (60) days prior to entry into the United States. Steers and spayed heifers from herds equal to U.S. Accredited TB-Free herds may enter Arkansas without testing provided they are moved directly from the herd of origin across the border as a single group and not commingled with other cattle prior to arriving at the border and obtain an entry permit prior to entering Arkansas.
3. Steers and spayed heifers from Mexican states that have been determined by the State Veterinarian of Arkansas, based on the recommendation of the Bi-National Committee, to have achieved Accredited Free status may enter Arkansas without testing provided they are moved as a single group and not commingled with cattle of a different status prior to arriving at the border and obtain an entry permit prior to entering Arkansas.
4. Holstein and Holstein-cross steers and spayed heifers from Mexico are prohibited from entering Arkansas regardless of test history.
5. Rodeo stock from Mexico must be tested negative for tuberculosis within sixty (60) days prior to their utilization as rodeo or roping stock under the supervision of a USDA/APHIS port veterinarian or a U.S. accredited

eighteen (18) months of age and over must have a negative brucellosis test conducted at a state or federal laboratory within thirty (30) days prior to exhibition.

Those exempt from testing requirements are as follows:

A. Animals originating out of Class Free states

B. Animals originating out of Certified Free Herds provided that the Certified Free

Herd number and test date is recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection. Rodeo bulls participating in a recognized and organized performance group may enter with a negative test for brucellosis within twelve 12 months if they are individually identified and accompanied by an entry permit regardless of state or area status.

1. Tuberculosis Requirements:

All sexually intact dairy cattle six months of age and older for interstate entry into Arkansas will be required to have a negative tuberculosis (TB) test within sixty (60) days prior to entry.

A. These same dairy cattle will also be required to have an entry permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection prior to entry, as well as the negative test and must be officially identified.

B. Sexually intact dairy cattle under six months of age can be permitted under a hold order direct to a premise or designated facility and held there until they are tested negative at six months of age, at owner's expense.

C. The new regulation exempts dairy cattle that originate from accredited free TB herds (but not free states). Neutered dairy feeder cattle, and dairy cattle delivered direct to slaughter, or delivered to a market for sale direct to slaughter.

## 2. Rodeo Stock

A. All rodeo bulls twelve (12) months of age and older must have a tuberculosis test annually (12 months) before entry into Arkansas for a rodeo. This requirement applies to all rodeo bulls regardless of their origin state or area status, and even rodeo bulls from Arkansas. All bulls must be individually identified with some type of USDA official ID. Out of state rodeo bulls are required to have a thirty (30) day CVI and an entry permit.

B. All roping and dogging steers and heifers must have an annual tuberculosis test (every 12 months) before entry into AR for a rodeo. This requirement applies to all steers and heifers regardless of the origin, state or area status, and even steers and heifers from Arkansas. All steers and heifers must be individually identified with some type of USDA official ID. All tie-down and roping calves are exempt from this regulation. In addition, M branded (Mexican) steers and heifers must have two negative annual tests for TB or one negative yearly test plus a sixty (60) day negative TB Test. Out of state steers and heifers are required to have a thirty (30) day CVI and an entry permit.

3. All breeding beef cattle 12 months of age and older entering Arkansas must meet one (1) of the following requirements:

A. Originate from a tuberculosis-free state;

B. Originate from a tuberculosis-free herd. The herd number and current herd test date must be shown on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection;

C. Test negative within sixty (60) days of shipment;

1. These same beef cattle will also be required to have a certificate of veterinary inspection and will be

purchased flowers accepted. All arrangements must have background foliage or offset specimen. Dried arrangements must be new this year, not previously exhibited.

### Pickles and Relishes

### Statement from State

The fair board of any county, district, or the state fair reserves the right to have a blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any animal at their fair. Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of an animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in a quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition. Their name and the lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA and FDA for further investigation and possible prosecution.

### EXHIBITION HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND EXOTIC ANIMALS GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. Certificate of veterinary inspection AND ENTRY PERMITS:  
"Certificate of veterinary inspection" refers to a legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin) by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet health requirements of the state of destination. It must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. Entry permits are required on all out-of-state swine, rodeo bulls, psittacines, passerines, ratites, all other avian species except poultry and turkeys, camelids, or exotic animals. Permits are also required on all cattle entering Arkansas from any state that is not a tuberculosis free state, unless that state has a reciprocal agreement with

Arkansas. Permit numbers can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office (501) 907-2400 from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all out-of-state animals; and A. Must be available on request by animal health officials.

B. Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, registration number or ear notch. Steers should be identified by description.

C. Show required tests, vaccinations, and entry permit number, if applicable. D. Show name and address of owner or exhibitor--this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.

2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infectious or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis, will not be permitted to exhibit.

3. All animals entering the grounds, including those shown in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet requirements of their particular species.

4. All animals originating out of areas quarantined because of other diseases (vesicular stomatitis, scabies, etc.) shall not be permitted to enter the state.

### OUT-OF-STATE CATTLE

1. Valid certificate of veterinary inspection
